

Injury, late Tyger run end Giants' year on sour note

BASCOM - Even the most hardened coach would have let their emotions flow on Tuesday.

In fact, veteran Fremont Ross taskmaster Sue Wolf did just that.

Not only did Wolf lose a "special" senior class with a 42-31 setback to Mansfield Senior in the first-round Division I sectional game at Hopewell-Loudon, but she was also forced to watch starter Abby Werling leave the game with a horrific injury late in the fourth quarter.

The two teams entered the final period knotted at 23-23, but the Tygers scored the contest's last nine points after the Little Giants had cut the deficit to 33-31 on a Tia Simms three-point

play with 2:22 remaining. Seconds after Simms' basket and free throw, it became almost impossible for the Giants to focus on basketball.

Werling, who Wolf characterized as "fearless" while struggling to maintain her compo-

sure, incurred a gruesome compound fracture of her left arm. The Giants, seemingly energized by Simms, were completely halted thereafter.

"The injury stopped their momentum," Tyger coach Andrea Thompson said. "They were heating it back up."

It's certainly difficult to find fault in the Giants' leakhusten.


fault in the Giants' lackluster finish after being forced to en-

dure Werling's departure.

Mansfield, which reached the final four last season, scored the first four points of the game be-fore the Giants took a 6-4 lead. Ross didn't relinquish the advantage until the Tygers took a 25-23 lead with 6:55 to play in the fourth quarter.

The Giants turned the ball over 27 times while forcing 22 miscues. Each team played a sluggish and methodically inefficient game offensively and scored in double digits in only one quarter.

points in the first half. She scored 15 of the Giants' 31 points overall and led all scorers.

"She was doing it all for them," Thompson said. "We told the girls that was somebody we needed to stop."


Marroquin that led to a basket by Hammer on successive possessions made the score

But just as it did in a 45-43 loss to Mansfield Senior on Feb. 7. Ross went nearly 10 minutes without a field goal. Surprisingly, a Hammer steal and transition basket ended the drought with the Giants trailing only 29-27 midway through the fourth.

Simms scored only five points in the game after leading the team with 16 in the earlier matchup.

Hammer, Marroquin, Willoughby and Shannon Hickey played their final game for Ross.

"We'll miss their leadership," Wolf said.
