# Tygers' rally stuns Little Giants

## Mansfield wins in double OT

WILLARD — With 43 seconds left in the second half of Wednesday's Division I district semifinal, things were looking good for Fremont Ross. The Little Giants held a 10-point lead and Ross fans were raucously chanting, "It's all over." Reggie Jones knew better.

Reggie Jones knew better. The Little Giants' senior had seen the Tygers pull out miracles against his team

before, and he was about to see it again. Mansfield went on a 12-2

Mansfield went on a 12-2 run in the final 43 seconds, tied the game on a 40-foot shot at the buzzer by John Brooks, and held off the Little Giants for a 72-69 win in double overtime in a battle for the ages at Willard High

"I think a couple guys thought it was over," said Jones. "But all I kept thinking about was the last two times against them, with them coming back in the last minute, and sending the

game to overtime."

For the third time in four

years, the Little Giants met the Tygers in the district tournament, and for the third time it was an overtime classic.

Brooks, a 6-foot junior guard, carved his place in the Mansfield basketball history books with one of the most dramatic shots in school history. After Jones hit a pair of free throws with 3.2 seconds left, Brooks brought the ball just past half-court and let fly as the buzzer sounded. His shot hit nothing but net,

sending the game into overtime and the Mansfield crowd into hysterics. The Little Giants had the

The Little Giants had the big play in the first overtime, as Jones scored off an offensive rebound with seven seconds to play to tie the game.

Ross almost had one miracle left, but Juan Vela's 3pointer at the second overtime buzzer bounced off the front of the rim, and the fourth-ranked Tygers escaped

caped.
"I'm definitely very proud of my team," said Ross coach Mark Gedoon. "They laid it all on the line. We wanted them to have to hit a

The Tygers (21-1) advanced to the district final at

11 a.m. Saturday against No. 7 Lima Senior at the University of Toledo's Savage Hall. The Spartans beat Celina 77-68 in a district semifinal Wednesday at Liberty Benton High School.

### Ross loses thriller to Mansfield

The Little Giants (17-5) saw their season ended by the Tygers in a district semifinal for the second year in a row. Mansfield rallied late in regulation and beat Ross 81-77 in overtime last year. In 1997, Ross overcame a 3-pointer at the buzzer by the Tygers' Marquis Sykes and posted a 75-86 district final win.

scored 21 points and added five as-sists. But more importantly, he filled the void at point guard, left when starter T.J. Hammer suffered a season-ending ankle injury in the sectional tournament. Ross turned the ball over 24 times, but 14 came in the first half before Vela became the primary ballhandler.

"I was really concerned about

The Little Giants hit all seven of their field goal attempts in the fourth quarter to open up the big lead. A pair of free throws by Al-

reach. A pair of the throws by Alfonzo Vann gave Ross a 53-43 lead with a little over a minute left.

Joe Allen hit one of two for the Tygers with 42.5 seconds left. Rick Minard followed a Ross turnover with a 3-point shot that bounced off

with a 3-point shot that bounced on the rim twice and fell in with 30 seconds to play. Ross missed two free throws and Aunre Shaw hit a 3-pointer with 14.9 seconds left. After two more Ross misses from the free throw line, Herman Davis scored off an

offensive rebound to slice the gap to one with 10 seconds to play. Dagg was fouled, but missed both shots, Reggie Jones grabbed the rebound and was fouled. He made both, but Brooks followed with his miracle tree

miracle trey.
"Truthfully, I thought it was over," Brooks said of the 10-point deficit. "But I had it in the back of my mind that I was going to fight back myself if I had to."
Mansfield hit 3-of-4 from 3-point

range and forced two turnovers in the season-saving run. In the end, poor free throw shooting doomed the Little Giants. Ross hit 16-0f-31 from the line, including 2-of-8 in the final minute

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"The only thing we're thinking is, just give a great effort to the very end." Mansfield coach Gregg Collins said. "Do whatever you can. Obviously when you're down by that much, that late, you're going to need to hit some 3s, and you need to make some stops defensively. Obviously, they're not going to force the issue, so we wanted to ry to create some turnovers and foul. Fortunately, they missed some free throws and we hit some shots that we don't normally hit. They aren't in our offense, I'll tell you that much."

The Little Giants had the miracle at the end of the first overtime. Down by four, Dagg hit a pair of

cle at the end of the first overtime. Down by four, Dagg hit a pair of free throws to slice the gap to two, and Mansfield's Maurice Bradley traveled on the ensuing inbounds pass. Terrence Jones took a pass from Vann and launched a 3-pointer that missed long. But Reggie Jones grabbed the board and put it back in with seven seconds left. The Tygers didn't get a shot off and the game went to double overtime. "It wasn't designed for Terrence," said Gedeon. "We weren't looking to win the game there, we were looking to go to a second

were looking to go to a second overtime. We made sure we ran an overtime. We made sure we ran an out of bounds play that had several different options, with Reggie being the first option. Terrence inbounded the ball to Alfonzo, and was smart enough to go outside for the 3. He had a real good look to win it, and Reggie was thinking ahead and thinking miss, which you have to do an offensive re-bounder, and he finished the bas-

Ross missed on its first four shots of the second overtime, and Mansfield opened up a five-point lead and had possession of the ball.

After a Brooks free throw the Little Giants had a last chance to tie, but Vela's 3-pointer bounced off the front of the rim as time expired.

"When I released it, it felt good," said Vela. "But then I looked up and it looked a bit short. But that's the best I could do."

In the first half, Minard showed why he was named the Dis-trict 6 Player of the Year. The 6foot-3 senior easi-ly drove to the basket en route to 16 first-half



16 first-half points. Mean-while, Ross strug-gled offensively, hitting just 9-0f-20 field goals in the first two quarters and committing 14 turnovers. The Tygers seemed to be a step quicker throughout the first half and held a 28-22 lead at the break.

But Minard picked up his third foul early in the quarter and sat for

foul early in the quarter and sat for the next five minutes. Shortly after his return, he picked up No. 4 and returned to the bench. He finished the game with 25 points, before fouling out with 1:30 left in the first overtime

overtime.
"We figured out what they were doing," Vela said. "No. 24 (Minard) got the ball and went baseline. Once we cut down the baseline, we were able to stop them. They were quicker, but not that much quicker."

Without its leader, Mansfield missed its first five shots and committed eight turnovers in the first 5:33 of the third quarter, and Ross went on a 12-0 run to take a 34-28 lead.

"We knew they were going to come out and try to put us away in the third quarter," said Dagg. "They put Sandusky away in the third quarter (in a 94-62 sectional final win Friday), so we knew they'd want to do that to us too. So we wanted to get into the gross, try we wanted to get into the game, try

we wanted to get into the game, try to not let them put us away, and we did a good job of that."

The key to Ross's comeback in Gedeon's eyes was the Little Gi-ants' increased offensive efficien-cy. In the second half and over-times, Ross hit 15-0f-38 field goals. But Mansfield turned on its man press late in the third and scored the final seven points of the period. Ross committed three turnovers in

the span.
"We had a nice lead, and went up "We had a nice lead, and went up by six, but we got a little happy with that," Gedeon said. "They go down and hit a layup and they come right back and turned it into a ballgame. So instead of being up by six, we were down one going in-to the fourth." Mansfield struggled from the floor throughout most of the game.

The Tygers hit 24-of-73 (32.9 per-cent) from the floor, including a 5-for-28 effort from behind the 3-point

The Little Giants controlled the boards in the second half. Af-ter being out-rebounded in the first two quarters, Ross grabbed 29 boards in the second half and overtimes, compared to 22 for the Tygers. Mansfield scored just two second chance points after halftime.
