## Ross bounced from tourney

WILLARD - Bob Nocton discounted any help from above, but the luck of the Irish was anther matter.

Nocton said he had the luck

and his Tiffin Columbian team benefitted Tuesday night, shock-ing Fremont Ross in the final 16 seconds for a 62-59 victory in the first game of the Division I boys basketball sectional tournament at Willard High School.

Columbian, 10-11, plays Sandusky Friday for the sectional title while Ross bows out with a 10-11 mark after losing its last

nine games.

Mike Betz, who tied the game at 59 on a three-pointer from deep in the left corner with 16 seconds remaining, pushed in a soft one-hander from 8 feet away with two seconds left for the game-winner.

Betz's clutch basket followed a
missed Ross free throw with 13
seconds remaining and came
after two of his Columbian teammates had missed chances.
"I'm pretty much an Irish
guy," Nocton said while relaxing
with a soft drink. "I'm pretty
much a lucky guy."
Ross coach Frank Gioffre said,

Along the way, Ross lost lead-ing scorer Chris Wolfe to fouls with 4½ minutes to play and 6-7 Jeff Green became saddled with his fourth foul late in the third quarter.

Green was Nocton's biggest

"Green is so strong that we cannot block him out," Nocton said. "We tried to convince the ref that he was over the back which it looks with a tall guy on a smaller guy... sometimes it was and other times our guys just weren't doing a good job of rooting back, but he was definitely more trouble for us even though Wolfe is probably a more

complete player."
Ross assistant coach Jim Morgan said, "If there was one person who could not get into foul trouble, it was Jeff because we

Gioffre added, "Jeff played a nice game when he was in there moving to get the ball and Chris was the same way; they did a nice job on the glass but when they went out, they (Columbian) just took it at us and got a lot of second and third opportunities."
Vince Perrine, who shook off a "box-and-one" defense to score 28 points, had his jumper from the free throw line blocked by

- racing to a 12-2 lead 51/2 minutes into the game. Green scored six of his 11 points and Wolfe five, but Columbian cut the deficit to 12-7 at the end of the first period on a Matt Fawcett basket and the first of Betz's two 3pointers.

After Mark Gottron put Ross up 15-7 with a three-pointer opening the second quarter, it was all Columbian. Perrine, a 6-foot-2 senior transfer from Findlay, scored 12 points, leading Columbian to a 30-27 halftime edge.

Ross opened the second half with a 10-2 run for a 37-32 lead but the Tornadoes bounced back, taking a 40-39 lead on Fey's 3point bucket. Wolfe's free throw and Clark's three-point goal put Ross up 43-40 but Perrine tied it at the end of the periond on a three-point play.

In the final quarter, Ross led by four points on three occasions and held a 59-56 lead when Clark and Green made one-of-two free throws each with Green's coming at the 27-second mark.


Betz followed with his long bomb.

After a Ross timeout, Perrine was called for holding Nick Wolf on the inbounds play with 13 seconds to play, but Wolf missed the foul shot, Perrine got the ball to set off the frantic final seconds.

Clark led Ross with 15 points and Wolfe had 12.
