

"Billy always wanted to be a part of a team, and there is no question that he was part of this team for three years.

Added Diller: "He was a blast at practice.

We would tease each other in practice. He likes Michigan, and I like Ohio State. I always gave him a hard time. It was fun having him around. He was great for us.

'He was a good guy," Diller added. "It's sad to see him go.

The Little Giants wore black tape on their jerseys in honor of Stierwalt.

Gedeon, though, said he steered away from a "Win-one-for-the-Gipper speech."

"We weren't trying to win this game for Billy," Gedeon said. "We were trying to win the game about Billy. I think there's a difference.

'The way Billy conducted his life and how he did everything with all of his power — to be the best that he could be - was an example for all of us," he continued. "We as people and basketball players have to have that same attitude. When you get that opportunity to do the best you can with the best attitude possible ... that's what Billy was about.'
