
Tournament trail tough

Little Giants come up short as Findlay moves on 55-51

BASCOM — Findlay withstood a frantic Ross rally in a 55-51 victory in the Division I girls district basketball semifinals Friday night at Hopewell-Loudon High School.

The Trojans, 16-7, avenged two regular season losses to the Little Giants, 16-6. Findlay will play Defiance at 7:30 p.m. this evening in the finals. Defiance beat Sandusky 54-30 in the other semifinal.

"It's hard to beat a team three times in one season," Findlay coach Bill Lobb agreed. "It's one of those things where when you beat a team twice ... it's in the back of your mind 'Can we do it three times?' "

Ross couldn't, but the Little Giants did not go easily.

Findlay, after leading 26-23 at haltimef, sank 9 of 12 third-quarter shots to open up a 45-35 advantage. With 2½ minutes remaining in the game, Findlay held a 52-42 lead before Ross mounted its charge.

Natalie Robbins hit a bucket and a free throw for Ross before Julie Niekamp made 1 of 2 foul shots for Findlay. Tami Reinbolt came back with bucket for Ross and a steal and basket by Christy Holland cut the Findlay

Robbins converted on a Trojan turnover and Ross was within two — 53-51 — with 35 seconds left, but Findlay's Amy Jauert stepped up, hit two free throws with 23 seconds left and Findlay was able to hang on.

"Ross plays so doggone hard I guess we are talking about both teams here," Lobb said. "Sue does a good job with them but I thought if we tried to do something a little different at the beginning that they had not seen from us, it would hurt them."

Lobb used a "3-2" defense at the beginning, spiced it with a "triangle and two" and "1-3-1" defenses at various stages. The "two" man-to-man defenders in the triangle and two were first on Cortney Cominsky and Robbins and then on Cominsky and Reinbolt.

Cominsky had a season-low four points but six of her seven first-half misses, rimmed the bucket and rolled off.

"We've seen the triangle and two before," Wolf said. "Our offense works against it most of the time, but we missed a lot of shots we should have been mak-

Jauert scored 20 points, seven

lead to 53-49 with a minute to in the final quarter. Jauert play. scored 10 points in the first quarter but was held to three points in the middle two periods.

> "Jauert's a player," Wolf said, "no question about that."

> Niekamp, a 6-foot freshman, and 5-10 senior Becky Earlie picked up the scoring slack for the Trojans while the Ross defense silenced Jauert. Niekamp scored 13 and Earlie 12.

> "Niekamp came in a really gave us a spark offensively," Lobb pointed out, "which we sorely needed."

> Dawn Zerman and Reinbolt led Ross with 13 points apiece. Robbins added 12.

St. Joe can't come back either as St. Peter's advances 51-42

NORTH ROBINSON — There were several cracks in Mansfield St. Peter's game-long lead here Friday night.

The Fremont St. Joseph Central Catholic girls basketball team never slipped through them, though, and fell from the Division IV district tournament 51-42 at Colonel Crawford High School.

"We made so many runs at them," St. Joe coach Gary Geller said.

After the Spartans scored the first 11 points of the game, St. Joe pulled within 14-10. St. Peter's, which will play Buckeye Central for the district championship tonight, answered with 12 straight points.

St. Joe, 16-7, made it 28-17 before the Spartans closed the first half with an 8-2 run.

"We shot the ball exceptionally well," St. Peter's coach Jeff Strang said. "This was one of

our better games."

The Spartans made 12 of their 17 field goals in the first half, including five by Laura Uhde. "That surprised me," Geller said.

Uhde backed Darcy Foor's 15 points with 12, and Teresa Alt added 10 for the Spartans.

Kris Gonya led St. Joe with 10, and her only two field goals came in the third quarter when the Crimson Streaks sliced a 39-24 deficit to 39-29 at one point.

Late in the third quarter and early in the fourth, St. Peter's missed several shots and the Streaks — led by Patti Hossler and Amy Szymanowski who had 10 rebounds apiece — cleared the defensive rebound every time.

"We couldn't score at the other end," Geller said.

While shooting 34 percent (13 of 38), the Streaks committed 31 turnovers.

"I thought we would handle the press better," Geller said. "We made a lot of dittle mistakes. We either threw it right to them or we didn't step to the basketball. A lot of unintelligent turnovers, things that we hadn't done in awhile. We haven't had those turnovers in five ballgames."

St. Joe made its 41-31 when Emily Wilhelm opened the fourth quarter with a basket, but Uhde and Foor scored for St. Peter's and the Spartans lead was back to 14 points with five minutes remaining to be played.

According to Strang, in the 18 years of girls basketball in Ohio, either St. Peter's or Buckeye Central have advanced from this district. Buckeye Central, which defeated New Riegel 56-54 in the other semifinal, has eight district titles and the Spartans nine.

"Now that St. Joe and New Riegel are over here, it's getting tougher,' Strang said.

St. Joe missed its chance to end the string.

"It's frustrating," Geller said. "We had the opportunities."
