## **Heidelburg delivers sectional title**

## Ross guard scores 32 points in tournament win against Northview

TOLEDO - Wednesday's hazardous waste spill on the Ohio Turnpike near Fremont snarled traffic and delayed Fremont Ross's trip to Toledo Waite for a sectional basketball game against

Sylvania Northview.

Once the Little Giants arrived, however, there was little anyone could do to slow down Joell Hei-

delburg.
Heidelburg, continuing a knack
for excelling in important games,
scored a career-high 32 points as
Ross beat the Wildcats 72-67 for a
sectional title in a game marked
by private leavest.

Each team had five runs of 5-0 or better, with Ross pulling away for good with a 6-0 run to take a 60-54 lead midway through the

final quarter.
The Little Giants (14-7) advance to play in the district semifinals March 12 against the winner of Friday's game between Bowling Green and Toledo St. John's.

Northview's season ends at 11-10. And the Wildcats have plenty of memories of Heidelburg to

haunt them in the offseason.

"He's a player," Northview coach Dennis Shoemaker said of the 5-foot-11 junior. "We knew he could score, we knew he could penetrate and we knew he could

shoot 3-pointers.
"We thought we needed to keep him under 30. Obviously, we didn't do that."

Heidelburg made five 3-point shots in the first three quarters and made 7 of 8 free-throw attempts in the fourth to seal the

"The big-time players do big things in big-time games," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said. "It's part of the nice maturation process."

As a sophomore, Heidelburg played his best basketball in the postseason, finding his 3-point range just in time to help the Little Giants to sectional and district championships. This season Hei-delburg scored 29 points in both wins against a talented Sandusky

wins against a talented Sandusky teams.
Heidelburg admitted his attitude changes for March Madness.
"In a tournament game, you know that if you lose, it's your last game," said Heidelburg, who averaged 16.4 points per game in the regular season.

Ross will be waiting — and


Coach Mark Gedeon plans to practice Friday, feed his team pizza and then shuttle players to the other sectional title

game to scout.



were not enough to put away the Wildcats, who stayed close in part because of the inside-outside duo of Mike Pierce and Eric Zare.

Pierce, a 6-5 senior center, scored 10 first-half points and Zare drained three 3-pointers as the teams battled to a 32-32 tie.

Ross implemented a mixture of zone and man-to-man defenses in the second half to limit Pierce's output.

The first surge of the third quarter belonged to Northview, which scored eight straight points to erase a three-point deficit and take a 42-37 lead.

Ross responded, closing the quarter with a 17-5 run that featured six points from Heidelburg, five from Tyson Liggins and four from Reggie Jones. Ross led 54-47 entering the final eight min-

utes of play.

Brock Rieger hit a 3-pointer and a 2point field goal and Zare made a jump shot to start the fourth quarter for Syl-vania, tying the game at 54-all. But Jones, who scored all 11 of his points in the first half, scored on a

post-up move for Ross. Heidelburg followed hit both ends of the bonus on Ross's next trip and Jones scored off of an offensive rebound after that as the Little Giants reclaimed a six-point advantage. Heidelburg added five more free throws and a jump shot in the final minutes as Northview drew no closer than four points.

"We executed pretty well, but their quickness really hurt us," Shoemaker said. "I told our guys that if (Ross) scored over 70 points, they were going to win.'

NOTES: The turnpike accident was reported at 1:58 p.m. and both east-bound and westbound lanes were closed for the cleanup of phosphoric acid. Coach Mark Gedeon called Waite High School officials from the turnpike to let them know the Little Giants to let them know the Little Giants might arrive late. Ross was in Toledo by 5:45 p.m. for the 6:30 game, howev-er. ... Mike Pierce and Eric Zare fin-ished with 18 points apiece for Northview.
